




Message from the Editor



The moon above gives a silver glow, As the girl swings gently to and fro.



Al in Our Classrooms and How It's Changing Learning

- 1. Al, or Artificial Intelligence, is a technology that allows computers to "think" and "learn" like humans. In classrooms, Al is already helping students and teachers in new ways. One of its main benefits is personalized learning. With Al, students can get lessons tailored to their own level. For example, if you're good at certain math problems but need more help with others, Al can adjust the lesson to focus on the areas you need to work on most. This allows students to learn at their own pace, making schoolwork more manageable and enjoyable.
- 2. Al can also provide extra support outside of the classroom. With Al chatbots and educational apps, students can get answers and hints while doing homework or studying on their own. Plus, Al saves teachers time by grading quizzes and tracking student progress, which frees up more time for teachers to help students individually or create new activities for the class.
- 3. However, there are some challenges with using AI in schools. Since AI is still learning, it doesn't always understand things as well as a teacher might. Similarly, AI should be used as a helper, but we also need to keep building skills like critical thinking, problem-solving, and social skills.
- 5. Finding a balance with AI is the key to using it effectively.
